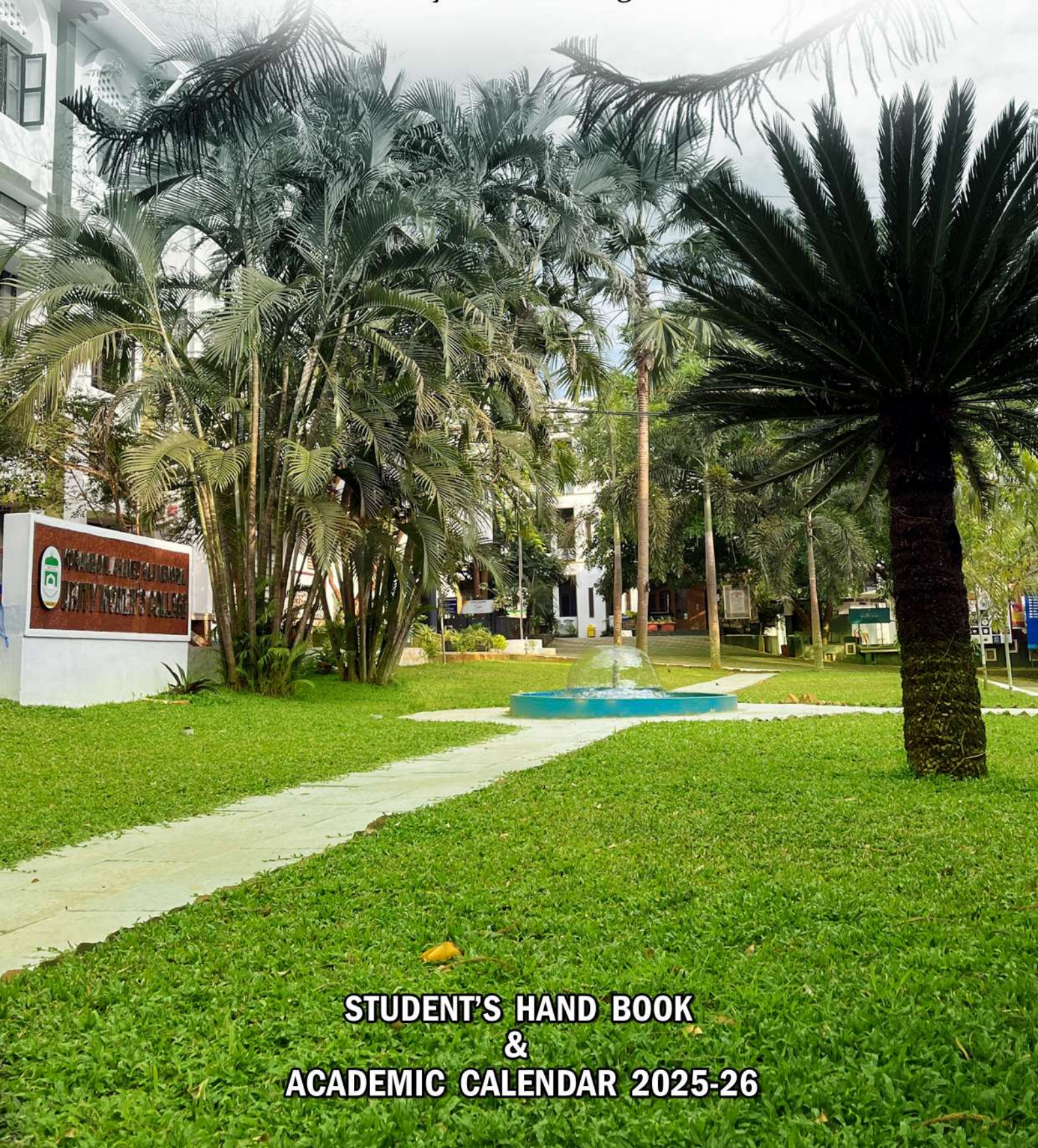

COLLEGE PROFILE

KAHM Unity Women's College, established in 1991, is managed by the Muslim Educational and Cultural Association (MECA), a registered society. It began as a First Grade Aided College affiliated to the University of Calicut and holds the distinction of being the first multi-disciplinary (Arts, Science, and Commerce) women's college in Malappuram District. It is also the first institution of its kind run by the Muslim community in Kerala.

The college aims at the upliftment of women in general, and educationally backward Muslim women in particular, through the provision of quality education.

Located 1.6 km off the Manjeri–Calicut Road at Koodakkara, the college offers 10 undergraduate programmes, 7 postgraduate programmes, and 3 research programmes in a serene and green campus. With commendable achievements in both academic and co-curricular fields, the college provides excellent facilities including transportation, hostel accommodation, a physical fitness centre, indoor stadium, well-equipped library with internet facilities, incubation centre, and modern IT laboratories.

The college was included under Sections 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act in 1998 and received Minority Status from the National Commission for Minority Educational Institutions (NCMEI) in 2010. The institution has been re-accredited by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) in 2025 (4th Cycle) with a CGPA of 3.20 at Grade 'A'.

FOUNDER PRESIDENT & MANAGER



Jb. Korambayil Ahamed Haji (1930–2003)

Korambayil Ahamed Haji, former General Secretary of the Kerala State Muslim League and founder of Unity Women's College, was known as a "*gentleman politician*." A multifaceted personality, he was a lover of art, literature, and sports—especially football. He was the President of Kerala Football Association. He represented Mankada and Kuttippuram constituencies in the Kerala Legislative Assembly. He also served as Deputy Speaker and was later elected to the Rajya Sabha.

He was honoured with the title '*Kalapalaka Rathnam*' for his contributions to Mappila art and literature. During his tenure as Chairman, the Mahakavi Moyinkutty Vaidyar Smarakam became a reality. Closely associated with the Hidayathul Muslimeen Sabha, Manjeri, he served as its General Secretary and as President of the Manjeri Central Mahallu and H. M. Yatheemkhana Sangam. He also served as Secretary of Mampad College, which was later handed over to MES.

His long-cherished dream of establishing an Arts and Science College for women in Manjeri was fulfilled in 1991 with the inauguration of Unity Women's College by Sayyid Mohammed Ali Shihab Thangal, in a function chaired by Dr. T. K. Raveendran, the then Vice-Chancellor of the University of Calicut. As President of MECA (Muslim Educational and Cultural Association) and Manager of the college, he played a pivotal role in its growth. In recognition of his invaluable contributions, the college was renamed in his honour. Every year, 18th December is observed as *Foundation Day* with a memorial lecture in his memory.

FOUNDER GENERAL SECRETARY



Jb. Hassan Mahmood Kurikkal (1950–2012)

Jb. Hassan Mahmood Kurikkal, the Founder General Secretary of Unity Women's College, was a visionary leader and prominent political figure of Malappuram District. Born into the renowned Kurikkal family of Manjeri, he completed his undergraduate studies at Farook College and obtained his LLB degree from Aligarh Muslim University.

He began his professional life as a lawyer in Manjeri and later devoted himself entirely to public service. His leadership abilities and dedication to community welfare earned him several distinguished positions, including Municipal Chairman and the first—and last—President of the Malappuram District Council. Even during his prolonged illness, which confined him to bed for nearly fifteen years, his strong will, compassion, and unwavering commitment to the people enabled him to remain an influential force in local governance. He was widely regarded as a decisive and respected figure in the political arena of Manjeri, especially in coalition politics.

As the first General Secretary of Unity Women's College Committee, he rendered nearly two decades of dedicated service, offering steadfast guidance during the formative years of the institution. His vision, determination, and sincere efforts played a crucial role in the steady growth and development of the college, leaving behind an enduring legacy of leadership and service.

Sayyid Munavvar Ali Shihab Thangal is the President of the KAHM Unity Women's College Committee. Born on 18th May 1977, he is the son of the visionary Sayyid Mohammadali Shihab Thangal and the grandson of Jb. Panakkad Pookoya Thangal. A distinguished social worker, philanthropist, educationalist, and youth leader, he is also a renowned scholar and traveller with a wide network of personal and professional friendships across the world. He currently serves as the State President of the Muslim Youth League Committee and is actively involved in several initiatives for youth empowerment and community development.

Under his guidance, Unity Women's College has established academic and research linkages with a group of European and Indian universities through the MIELES Project of the European Union, coordinated by Barcelona University, Spain, enhancing international collaboration and exposure for students and faculty.

Apart from his administrative role, Sayyid Munavvar Ali Shihab Thangal actively champions educational, philanthropic, and social initiatives, promoting progressive values, academic excellence, and community welfare. His vision and leadership continue to strengthen the mission of Unity Women's College, making it a center of holistic learning and social empowerment.

Adv. U.A. Lathif is one of the founding members of Unity Women's College. He served as the first Vice President and has been the General Secretary since 2012, succeeding Adv. Hassan Mahmood Kurikkal. He has also served as Municipal Chairman of Manjeri and General Secretary of the Malappuram District Muslim League Committee. A renowned lawyer in Manjeri Bar, he is leading the C. H. Centre, Manjeri, a philanthropic institution.

Born in 1950, he had his education at NSS College, Manjeri, Farook College, and Law College, Ernakulam, and was elected to the Kerala Legislative Assembly from Manjeri constituency in 2021. Despite his involvement in many other fields, he continues to lead the developmental activities of the college. He has travelled all over the world.

Jb. O. Abdul Ali, born in Manjeri in 1948, is one of the founding members of Unity Women's College. He had his education at Farook College and Government Engineering College, Thrissur and served with Indian Airlines, Bangalore, Kerala State Electricity Board, Manjeri, and the Engineering Department of Calicut University. He retired in 2003 as Executive Engineer.

He succeeded Jb. Korambayil Ahamed Haji as Manager of the college in 2003. He was a member of the Syndicate of Calicut University (2013–2017) and serves as Joint Secretary of the Kerala Private College Management Association and the Federation of Muslim Colleges. He also represented the college in the MIELES Program at Barcelona, Stockholm, Nicosia, and Berlin.

The Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS), introduced by UGC, aims to liberalize and modernize higher education. It allows students to choose from core, elective, and skill-based courses, promoting flexibility and holistic development. The system also supports credit transfer between institutions and flexible learning options. At the University of Calicut, CBCSS was implemented in 2009–10 and later revised in 2019 to cover all regular and SDE undergraduate programmes. The functioning of CBCSS in affiliated colleges is overseen by a College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC) chaired by the principal.

The Calicut University Four Year Undergraduate Programme (CU-FYUGP), launched in 2024-25, marks a major reform in Kerala's higher education. COLLEGE RULES

General Rules

1. Use of mobile phones is restricted in the college campus (other than monitored use).
2. Students shall behave with dignity and courtesy in the college.
3. Students shall always carry identity cards with them.
4. Political or such organizational activities of the students shall not be permitted in the campus.
5. Meeting of any kind shall not be organized or any sort of fund is to be collected without the permission of the principal.
6. Students shall not indulge in any kind of misdemeanour bringing disgrace to the institution.
7. Students shall not entertain visitors without prior permission.
8. Prescribed uniform is compulsory for the students on all days.
9. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited. The Principal, who is also the Warden, shall report any incident of ragging within the campus, hostel, or elsewhere to the nearest Police Station, and strict disciplinary action will be taken against the offenders.
10. The transportation facility provided by the College Management Committee is optional. Students using the college bus must strictly follow the rules of the Bus Committee.
11. Each student shall be a member of one of the clubs.

Fee and Attendance Regulations

1. Students who do not enjoy fee concession shall remit the fees, which will be collected in the office in 2 terms on the days noted in the calendar and also as notified from time to time.
2. Fee will be collected in the college office only on the specified collection days from 9.30 am to 3.00 pm.
3. No student shall be absent from the class without giving leave application.
4. Students who remain absent without leave for ten consecutive working days will be struck off the rolls.
5. Application for leave in the specified format (available in the college co-operative store) shall be forwarded to the HoD through the class tutor.

6. The Attendance Progress Conduct certificate (APC) required for appearing in university examinations will not be granted unless the HoD is satisfied with the attendance, conduct and progress of the student.

Disciplinary Rules

1. Students must maintain discipline within and outside the college. Acts of indiscipline may attract warnings, suspension from classes or library, or suspension from the college as decided by the College Discipline Committee.

SHIHAB THANGAL LIBRARY & INFORMATION CENTRE

The centre, established in 1991, is the academic heart of KAHM Unity Women's College, supporting the learning and research needs of students, faculty, and scholars. Housed in a newly expanded two-storey building of 9,000 sq. ft., the library offers more than 23,000 books, reference materials, and textbooks, along with national and international journals, magazines, and newspapers.

Fully automated with Koha Integrated Library Management Software (ILMS), the library provides easy access to its collection through WebOPAC. It also offers remote access to e-resources via DELNET, and maintains a DSpace Institutional Repository that archives faculty publications, research projects, Ph.D. theses, e-books, and past question papers.

The library includes dedicated areas for UG, PG, and research students, a digital resource centre, reference and career sections, and a spacious reading area. Equipped with Wi-Fi and CCTV, it provides a secure and supportive learning environment. In addition to book reservations, photocopying, and e-resource access, the library regularly organizes seminars, workshops, and reading activities to promote curiosity, academic growth, and lifelong learning.

The on-grid setup enables the college to supply excess electricity to KSEB and draw power from the grid when required. This initiative promotes the use of renewable energy and reflects the institution's commitment to a greener and more sustainable campus.

SUKRTHAM UNITY

Sukrtham Unity is the college's initiative to foster compassion and social responsibility among students, staff, and management. Under this, the *Snehabhavanam* Project constructs houses for homeless classmates, with three completed at Morayur, Perimbalam, and Manjeri, and a fourth under construction at Koottilangadi. Funds are raised through ₹100 and ₹50 coupons collected by students from friends and relatives. In addition, staff members and management also generously contribute to support the project. CAMPUS CAFETERIA

It provides healthy and economic food for all students and staff in the campus. The menu includes breakfast, traditional Kerala lunch, vegetarian and non-vegetarian meals, and a range of snacks at competitive prices. Students shall follow table manners in the cafeteria.

CH AUDITORIUM

The pride of our campus, the CH Auditorium is a state-of-the-art venue. Designed to host grand academic conferences, vibrant cultural

festivals, inspiring talks, and community celebrations, it stands as the heartbeat of the college. The auditorium creates an impressive setting that brings together intellect, creativity, and culture under one roof.

CONVEYANCE FACILITY

The college has a full-fledged Transport Department with 12 buses that provide safe and affordable travel for students and staff. Services operate between 8.30 a.m. and 5.00 p.m., covering the routes to Manjeri, Kondotty, Mongam, Kizhisseri, Pookolathur, Pandikkad, Areekode, Edavanna, and Malappuram (via Valluvambram and Anakkayam). The buses are also utilized for field trips, study tours, and industrial visits.

COOPERATIVE STORE

Textbooks, stationery items, and other consumable materials are available for sale through the College Cooperative Store. All staff and students are members of the society. Materials are sold at prices lower than market rates, and the profit is shared among the members. Printing and photocopying facilities are also available in the store.

INDOOR STADIUM

The Indoor Stadium is equipped with three badminton courts, along with Taekwondo and Judo mats for high-energy martial arts training and competitions. It also includes a table tennis board and two carrom boards. A Fitness Centre, associated with the stadium, supports strength training and overall wellness.

MIELES DIGITAL STUDIO

Modernizing and Enhancing Indian e-Learning Educational Strategies (MIELES) is a European Commission funded project which collaborates Indian institutions with European Institutions. Our college is the one and only Arts and Science College from Kerala with this collaboration. The college has established a Digital Studio in 2020 under MIELES project to promote virtual learning through content creation and live stream or record lectures/courses by the faculties.

NETWORK RESOURCE CENTRE (NRC)

To keep abreast of the changing trends in higher education, employment, and research, an NRC has been established on the campus. The Centre, functioning in the College Library, provides broadband internet facilities accessible to all students and staff.

RESIDENTIAL FACILITY

The College Hostel functions in a permanent building on the campus and provides accommodation for a limited number of students. Those who wish to join the hostel must submit a separate application after securing admission to the college and pay the establishment charges and caution deposit at the time of admission. The mess operates on a dividing system basis, and the mess dues and rent are to be paid monthly.

The Principal of the college serves as the Chief Warden, and the Chief Warden's decision shall be final in matters related to the admission and removal of students from the hostel. A faculty member nominated by the Principal functions as the Deputy Warden. The inmates shall strictly adhere the following hostel rules.

1. Students should maintain personal hygiene and also keep their rooms and surroundings clean.
2. The study time will be from 6.30 P.M. to 10.30 P.M. (excluding the dinner time and 15 minutes for recreation).
3. Students should strictly maintain silence and should not get involved in other entertaining activities during study hours.
4. Ragging and other offensive activities are strictly prohibited in the hostel. If found guilty, the concerned students will have to face disciplinary actions including legal formalities.
5. The penalty for the offences committed in the hostel shall warrant punishments from the college too, since the hostel is a part of the institution.
6. Inmates of the hostel should maintain table manners and keep discipline in the dining hall.
7. Hostel dues should be cleared each month. If not followed, the defaulter's names shall be removed from the roll.
8. No inmates shall leave the hostel without permission from the Deputy Warden (the request to be given in written format). The hostel gate shall remain closed after 06:00 P.M.
9. The behaviour of the students towards the hostel authorities, staff and caretakers should be amiable and polite.
10. Day scholars or outsiders are not permitted to visit the hostel without the permission of the Deputy Warden.

STUDENTS' AID FUND (SAF)

The SAF, maintained as per university norms, provides financial assistance to deserving and economically backward students. The fund is raised through voluntary contributions from staff and students. Assistance may cover tuition, books, stationery, hostel, mess, or transport expenses.

SWAYAM-NPTEL LOCAL CHAPTER

Our college is a local chapter of the National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL), a project by the IITs funded by the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD). NPTEL provides e-learning through online courses in Engineering, Sciences, Technology, Management, and Humanities. It is also a national coordinator of MHRD's SWAYAM programme, which offers Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs).

After these examinations, progress cards are issued to parents during class-wise **PTA meetings** convened by the class tutor. Attendance at internal examinations is mandatory for all students. Those who do not meet the required **Attendance, Progress, and Conduct (APC)** criteria are not eligible to appear for the University examinations, as per University regulations.

MEDIA AND PUBLIC RELATIONS CELL

The Cell is responsible for press coverage and all media-related activities of the college. It manages both internal and external communications and serves as the official spokesperson of the institution. The cell engages with print and digital media to maintain the college's public profile and online presence. It also handles internal communication by reporting events, achievements, and updates to the administration, faculty, and student community.

MINORITY CELL

The Cell aims to empower students from minority communities and support them in curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities. It has been established to help these students achieve holistic development within the college.

OBC CELL

The Cell empowers students from OBC communities in the region. The college actively facilitates financial support for these students through government agencies and other sources. The cell also works to address and resolve various academic, social, and personal issues faced by OBC students.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT (R&D) CELL

The Cell fosters research and innovative skills among faculty and students. It provides a platform for creativity and innovation, encouraging young minds to explore and develop new ideas. The cell plays a pivotal role in supporting innovative breakthroughs through its dedicated guidance and initiatives.

SC/ST CELL

The Scheduled Caste (SC) and Scheduled Tribes (ST) Cell promotes the academic, social, and personal development of students from reserved

categories. It provides guidance and support to help them overcome challenges and ensures they have access to opportunities and resources that facilitate holistic growth within the college.

SCHOLARSHIP CELL

Scholarship Cell has been established to channelize maximum scholarships to the students of the college. It aims to extend a helping hand to the student community of the college by which they will get to know various agencies that provide various scholarships and free ships. The scholarship cell has an Institutional Nodal Officer from the teaching staff and an office staff to assist and support the students in applying for various scholarships from Government and Non-Governmental agencies. The Nodal Officer and the office staff together discharge the verification and approval of the scholarships following all the due procedures. Another office staff of the college is in charge of the e-grants who meticulously work to bring in maximum number of e-grants from the Govt. to the deserving students.

The scholarship cell of the college organizes orientation sessions to the first-year students as a part of the bridge course of the fresher's and a separate orientation programme for the seniors to ease the renewal process of various scholarships. The cell regularly updates all the notifications of scholarships. WhatsApp groups are created and the student queries on scholarships in the groups are answered by the scholarship cell.

- Alchem Unity Free-ships: Alchem, the Alumni of Chemistry Department, offers free-ships to the meritorious and economically backward students from UG and PG Courses. The department selects five students for every academic year and the scheme covers the cost of the study materials.
- Management Free-ships: MECA, the college management, offers free-ships, and the scheme covers tuition fee, bus fee, and hostel fee to the needy and deserving students.

TRAINING AND PLACEMENT CELL

The Cell facilitates the placement of graduating students and collaborates with leading organizations to organize internships and training programs. It liaises with industrial establishments, corporate houses, and other institutions that conduct campus interviews to select students from all disciplines. The cell is supported by a committee comprising student representatives from both undergraduate and postgraduate programs.

UNNAT BHARAT ABHIYAN (UBA)

It is a flagship program of the Government of India aimed at linking higher education institutions with rural communities to promote sustainable development. Under this initiative, the college engages with nearby villages to identify challenges, provide innovative solutions, and implement community development projects in areas such as health, education, sanitation, energy, and agriculture, fostering social responsibility among students.

VIGILANCE CELL

The Cell aims to promote integrity and transparency in all functions of the institute, supported by CCTV monitoring. It ensures compliance with the directions and requirements of the Central Vigilance Commission, Government of India, fostering a culture of accountability within the college.

WOMEN CELL

Our college is one of the selected institutions by the Kerala State Women Development Corporation (KSWDC) for establishing a Women Cell. The cell conducts a variety of activities, including open forums, pre-marital counselling, women awareness camps, community awareness

sessions, and film screenings. Selected students also receive financial assistance from the cell.

With a vision to empower women and bring them to the forefront of societal development, the Women Cell functions as a change agent within the college, instilling confidence in the female student community. Some of its best practices include two-wheeler and four-wheeler training, student-run bicycle training, Campus Radio, and a Uniform Bank, helping students overcome constraints related to mobility, self-expression, and financial resources.

YOUNG INNOVATORS PROGRAMME (YIP)

The programme encourages students to develop innovative ideas and solutions to real-world problems. Through workshops, mentorship, and project-based activities, the programme nurtures creativity, critical thinking, and entrepreneurial skills, enabling students to transform their ideas into practical and impactful outcomes.

CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

ASSOCIATION ACTIVITIES

The bi-monthly Department-wise Association meetings serve as a dynamic platform for students and faculty, fostering a strong sense of community and intellectual engagement. Attended by all department members, these gatherings feature a variety of activities, including stimulating debates, insightful movie screenings, engaging quizzes, and experience-sharing sessions. By blending academic enrichment with recreational enjoyment, the events encourage participants to share perspectives and bond over common interests. Acting as a unifying force, the departmental association successfully strengthens connections within the department, promotes collaboration, and enhances the overall collegiate experience for all involved.

CALICUT UNIVERSITY SOCIAL SERVICE PROGRAMME (CUSSP)

Under the CBCSS, students must complete 42 days of social service over three years to earn their degree. The programme fosters social awareness and a service mindset and is managed by a college committee with a coordinator and class tutors.

COLLEGE MAGAZINE

The college magazine is published annually, showcasing students' artistic talents and enthusiasm for extra-curricular activities. It features contributions from students, staff, and interviews with renowned personalities, reflecting the combined creativity of both students and faculty. The magazine fosters reading habits, nurtures collaboration, and strengthens bonds among students, with the staff and student editors working together to bring out their full potential.

COLLEGE UNION

The College Union election is held annually in the Presidential mode, following University of Calicut regulations. The Union consists of a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, General Secretary, Joint Secretary, Fine Arts Secretary, Student Editor, General Captain, two University Union Councilors, Degree & PG Representatives, and Association Secretaries from core departments. Its key activities include organizing discussions with local leaders and literary figures, a three-day Arts Fest, charity initiatives, and the College Day celebrations. The Staff Advisor and faculty members support students in conducting these programmes.

FINE ARTS ACTIVITIES

Fine arts programs are organized under the guidance of the Fine Arts Secretary and Directors. Fine Arts Days on campus provide students a platform to showcase their talents. Top performers receive professional training to participate in the C-Zone, and those excelling there are further prepared for the Interzone competitions.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC)

The college has had an NCC unit since 2005, functioning under the 9 Kerala Girls Battalion, Calicut, with a strength of 106 cadets. Guided by the motto "Unity and Discipline," the unit aims to develop character, courage, comradeship, discipline, leadership, secular outlook, adventurous spirit, and

a sense of selfless service among students, shaping them into responsible citizens.

Scholarships: Rs.6000/- per year to 760 cadets. Best cadets Rs. 3500/- each, Second best cadet Rs. 2500/- each. Sahara Scholarships: SW Rs.12000/- each. Professional courses Rs. 30000/- (eligibility criteria-the candidate should have 80% attendance in NCC, 65 % mark in Science, 60% in Commerce, 55% in Arts stream in XII, should have completed at least 1 year of NCC in SW).

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

The main objective of NSS is to instill a spirit of service among students and promote their overall personality development through social and cultural activities. Students completing 240 hours of social work and attending one special camp receive a certificate from the University, which carries 5 marks weightage for higher studies. The college has two NSS units (171 and 008), each with an enrolment strength of 100 students.

NEWSLETTER

The college newsletter, *UNIQUE*: The Monthly Communique, initiated by the IQAC, is published every month to document college activities and keep students, faculty, and stakeholders informed about events and news within the college community.

CLUBS AND FORUMS

Various Clubs and Forums provide a platform for every student to showcase their talent, organizational skills, and work in a team in order to help the college reach a higher platform. The clubs include Dance, Music, Photography, and Art. They constantly work throughout the semester to come up with ways to showcase the passion of their members. The Community Outreach and Internship Cells aid students in their attempts to interact with NGOs and companies for their credit requirements and interests. The committees, including Academic Review and Anti-Sexual Harassment, work to provide discipline in their respective fields.

ADVENTURE CLUB

The club helps students face challenges with confidence and develop social responsibility. Activities include navigating rough terrain, assisting during natural disasters, and interacting with tribal communities, fostering physical, social, emotional, and intellectual growth.

AGRO & HORTICULTURE CLUB

UNITY IN DIVERSITY

AL HAMRA PARK

It is an open recreational and fitness space designed exclusively for students. It provides a serene environment where students can unwind, connect with nature, and engage in physical activities. The park is equipped with various exercise facilities and walking paths, promoting physical fitness, mental well-being, and a healthy lifestyle among the student community.

AURORA HUB

It is a creatively designed space for students to engage in socio, cultural and artistic activities. Thematically the space is designed with art and craft works that exhibits women's journey to empowerment. Hence, the space itself adds to the emotional and cultural upliftment.

AZADI SQUARE

Azadi Square is a special space established in connection with the 75th Anniversary of Indian Independence Day Celebrations, known as Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav. It serves as a platform for amplifying students' voices, allowing them to express their thoughts and ideas on important social and

national issues. The square hosts various events, including cultural programs, discussions, and activities that foster creativity and engagement among students. It also stands as a reminder of the values of freedom and democracy, inspiring students to actively participate in shaping the future of the nation.

BIRD WATCHING

Students of our college are interestingly organized Bird watching in the surroundings of our college and nearby forests. It is a peaceful way to connect the students with nature and observe the bird biodiversity around us. This activity encourages students to spend time outdoors, develop patience, and practice mindfulness as they learn to observe birds' unique behaviours, habitats and songs. Also, bird watching is a relaxing activity and a fantastic way to connect with nature, learn about local wildlife, and sharpen their observation skills.

ETHNOMEDICINAL GARDEN

The garden showcases plant species traditionally used by indigenous communities for their medicinal properties, hosting around 50 species such as *Vitex nigundo*, *Ocimum sanctum*, and *Rauwolfia serpentina*. It provides a hands-on learning platform for students in Botany, Pharmacology, and Ethnobotany to study plant characteristics, growth habits, and traditional applications, while promoting sustainable use, research, and conservation of medicinal plants.

FERN HORTICULTURE

The Fern Horticulture Garden, managed by the Botany Department, cultivates and conserves diverse fern species such as *Pteris*, *Asplenium*, *Nephrolepis*, *Adiantum*, *Dryopteris*, and *Selaginella* from temperate, tropical, and subtropical regions. Integrated into the curriculum, it provides students practical experience in fern care, propagation, and ecological study. The garden also supports biodiversity conservation, enhances campus greenery, and promotes appreciation of the ecological value and beauty of ferns.

HISTORY MUSEUM

The Ernad History Museum is a treasure trove of cultural and historical significance. Inaugurated in 2013, the museum aims to preserve

and showcase the region's rich heritage, promoting unity and cultural understanding.

The objectives of museum are:

- To showcase traditional knowledge and skills.
- To exhibit students' handmade replicas of historical monuments and artifacts.
- To showcase old tools and equipment's.
- To provide an interactive platform for learning and research.

Since its inception, the museum has welcomed numerous students, researchers, and history enthusiasts. It houses rare collections of ancient coins, manuscripts, agricultural tools, traditional clothing, jewellery, and utensils that reflect ancestral life. Students' handmade replicas of monuments and artefacts showcase their creativity and grasp of history. By preserving and displaying the past, the History Museum inspires future generations to value their cultural heritage and foster unity.

PISCICULTURE FACILITY

This setup is introduced to practice fish farming and feeding, focusing on sustainable methods, environmental impacts and economic viability. This setup includes water quality assessment, disease control and encouraging business in the field of fish farming. Hands-on trainings in local aquaculture systems are integrated to provide practical experience in managing fish farms.

POLLINATOR GARDEN/ BUTTERFLY RESERVE

The Pollinator Garden is a dedicated campus space that supports butterflies, bees, and other pollinators through nectar-rich plants such as *Zinnia peruviana*, *Tithonia diversifolia*, *Cosmos caudatus*, *Commelina bengalensis*, and *Clerodendrum infortunatum*. It preserves biodiversity by providing essential habitats and food sources for pollinators vital to plant fertilization and fruit production. Serving as an educational hub, the garden helps students learn about pollinator life cycles, ecosystem roles, and habitat conservation, fostering environmental awareness and practical learning.

RAIN WATER HARVESTING FACILITY

The college has implemented advanced rainwater harvesting systems to promote water conservation and sustainability. It has three tanks, built in

2011, 2017, and 2024, with capacities of 8,16,000 L, 1,15,000 L, and 10,00,000 L, respectively. Rainwater collected from rooftops is directed into recharge systems to replenish groundwater, ensuring a steady water supply year-round. These systems reduce dependence on external sources, support campus landscaping, and reflect the college's commitment to environmental conservation and responsible water management.

SKY WATCH

The college Sky Watch Facility, located on the library terrace, provides an elevated platform for stargazing and celestial observations. Equipped with a refracting telescope, it allows students and astronomy enthusiasts to explore planets, stars, and other celestial phenomena. The facility offers a clear, unobstructed view of the sky, and hosts sky-watching sessions and workshops to cultivate interest in astronomy, serving as a hub for scientific curiosity and learning.

WISDOM CIRCLE

Wisdom circle functions as a cultural space where students, alumnae, faculty members and entire unity family come together to engage in meaningful programmes, share knowledge and cultivate wisdom. It is an iconic space in the centre of the campus. This is an initiative by UCAA (Unity College Alumni Association in collaboration with college governing body. It acts as a meaningful space where alumni members come together to share their experiences, make strong bonding between the alumni and the college community and share expertise with current students, fostering a culture of lifelong learning and mentorship among the unity community.

ZOOLOGY MUSEUM

The Rosellin Frankelin Zoology Museum is dedicated to the preservation and display of animal specimens, covering both Chordata and non-Chordata. It houses vertebrates like mammals and fish, and invertebrates such as arthropods, mollusks, and cnidarians, along with skeletons to study structure and function. The museum provides practical learning opportunities, featuring specimens with taxonomic descriptions to enhance understanding of animal diversity, evolution, and ecological roles, serving as a valuable educational hub for students.
