3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

1. KAHM Unity Women's College, Manjeri collaborated with Barcelona University initiated international cooperation for academic enrichment. The project proposal for this MIELES Project was approved and an amount of Rs. 50 lakhs is sanctioned by the funding agency, European Union.
2. As a part of the 25th Anniversary Celebrations, the staff and students of our college constructed a house to one of the poor and needy student of our college. The project is named **Snehabhavanam** (A Home of Compassion). An amount of Rs. 8 lakh is spent for this purpose.
3. An amount of Rs. 42,000/- is given for the brain tumour operation of a 6 year old girl by collecting fund from teaching and non-teaching staff of our college.
4. The department of English maintains a website with address www.kahmunityenglish.in to showcase the history and the activities of the department. Additionally, to encourage the creative imagination and to display the scholarship of the faculty and the students of the department of English, the department provided an online platform, a blog titled, "Palimpzest" (palimpzest.blogspot.in). The department sends monthly newsletter that ensures the wide reach to the scholarly ventures of the faculty and the events of the department and strengthens the bond of the department with the academic community in an around Kerala.
5. Departments of History, English, Chemistry and FCS organized International, National and State level Conferences having Interdisciplinary significance and useful to the society in terms of empowerment. Kerala State Higher Education Council supported the initiatives to the Departments of English and History by providing financial assistance under Erudite Scheme to invite renowned scholars named, Professor Ronald Strickland of Michigan Technical University and Professor Fabio Parasecoli of New York University.
6. As a part of the Science Exhibition Programme of Al-Huda School, Patterkulam, the Chemistry students of our college demonstrated the chemistry experiments and exhibited chemistry glass wares to the school students. Also made aware the school students and local people the positive and negative impacts of scientific developments through charts and posters. Ms. Shabana K and Mrs. Najeera PC accompanied the students. Dr. Deepa K of our department judged the exhibition.
7. The PG department of Chemistry of our college and Kudumbasree Narukara unit jointly organized an awareness class on Waste Management to the local people and chemistry students as a part of National Science day Celebrations. Dr. P. Jyothi was the convener of the seminar. The Resource person was Mr.

Jabir Karat, Founder of Green Worms Eco Solutions.

8. Dr. Deepa K, Assistant Professor, PG Department of Chemistry conducted a study on the impact of solid waste dumping on some soil parameters of the dumping site at Vettekode, Manjeri Municipality. The report is handed over to Chairperson, Manjeri Municipality for favourable action.

9. The topics of remarkable interdisciplinary significance in the current scenario and contributing to the society were the subjects that the students of the institution selected for undergraduate and postgraduate projects. The following are a few notable works among them:

- The postgraduate students of Department of Computer science devised an application titled “The Bystander App” to monitor the body movement of disabled people, another application to help the farmers to increase productivity and a smart “medico stick” for the visually disabled.
- Significance of floral drug in Ayurveda of Botany students.
- Studies on the work life issues of the working women and the food habits and Kidney Disease of Family and Community Science Students.
- The study of water pollution and preparation of bio-plastics from plant starch of Chemistry students.
- Muslim Women Education in Malabar, Cultural History of the region, Kondotty, *etc.* projects on gender minorities, tribals and other marginalized categories by the students of Department of English.

10. The Erudite scholars visited our institution have shared their scholarship at Kannur University, DGMMES Mampad College and PSMO College, Thirurangadi as we collaborated with these colleges.

11. Korambayil Ahamed Haji Memorial Dissertation Awards is another highlight of the institution. The award is to honour the most outstanding PG Dissertation submitted in the state during the academic year.

12. Using the monthly contribution from teaching staff and students the following charity activities were conducted under the Share & Care Charity Scheme.

- June 2017: Renovation of home for Asari Gopi, Vadakepurath House, Alukkal, Narukara (PO) who is bedridden for eight years due to fracture of spinal cord by an accident.
- July 2017: Donated front door and back door to the house of Mr. Ramachandran (Kuttan), Nechikkundan House, Athikode, Narukara (PO) who is a psychiatric patient.
- August & September 2017: Tiled and fixed hand rail on the staircase in the house of Mr. Abdul Salam, s/o, Hassan Musliar Maniparamba, Narukara; who is paralysed by stroke.
- October & November 2017: Provided concrete doors and windows to the house of Mr. Abdul Majeed K, s/o, Moideen Kutty, Kayanikkara House, Alukkal, (PO) Mariyad; who is a cancer patient.
- December 2017: Provided financial assistance for plastering the house of Mr. Ali Musliyar, Athimannil House, Pattarkulam, (PO) Narukara; who is a very poor fellow.
- January 2018: Provided financial assistance to HibaThasni (6yrs) for the operation of Brain Tumour. *Address:* HibaThasni, D/O Basheer KP (Auto Driver), Kollapparamban House, Pullara, Memad, Valluvambram (PO), 673642

Young mothers and reproductive health- Dr. Rajeena, (MBBS, DGO, DRM-GERMANY) In the wake of increasing number of teenage pregnancies, post natal complications and maternal deaths reported in the district, a session was organised for the students of Unity Women’s College by Dr Rajeena, fertility specialist, highlighting the importance of physical, emotional, and intellectual awareness in developing oneself as a self-reliant, healthy woman. The faculties of Computer Science and Commerce of our institution has been drafting and suggesting the syllabus of B.Com. Computer Applications to the board of studies of Commerce at University of Calicut for the last 16 years. Dr. VP Abdul Nasar, Associate Professor in Commerce participated in the workshop conducted for the restructuring of Syllabus of BBA at PTM Govt. College, Perinthalmanna. Various departments of our institution restructured the syllabus of certificate/ diploma courses provided.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

For empowering our students, multiple Invited Talks, Seminars, Symposium and Workshops have been conducted regularly. Some of them are listed below.

- Department of Physics organized a ‘Nobel Lecture’ on 21 Feb 2018. Dr. Muhammed Saleem from IIT Bombay delivered a lecture on “The discovery of Gravitational Waves”, which secured the Nobel Prize in Physics for the year 2017.
- Department of Computer Science conducted an invited lecture on “Artificial Intelligence”, delivered by Mr. Muhammed Ramees, Founder of Microsoft Community in Kerala.
- Department of History organized an International Seminar on Food, Culture, and

Identity on 23 Feb 2018. The seminar were inaugurated by Prof. Fabio Parasecoli from New York University, USA.

- On 23 Feb 2018, an Erudite Lecture on the topic “Research in food studies” was organized by the Department of History and the speaker was Prof. Fabio Parasecoli from New York University, USA.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

External Examination: The University has been conducting centralized examinations at each semester end, and answer scripts have been evaluated through centralized manner or sometimes home valuation. For science subjects, practical examinations, project & viva-voce have been yearly conducted by the University.

Internal Examinations: Besides unit tests, conducting one centralized examination at semester ends, and retests as and when needed. Moreover, assignments, seminars and symposiums by students are being conducted in the presence of concerned teachers. Question answering practices are also encouraged during class hours.

6.3.4 Research and Development

6 minor and 1 major project have been going on at different departments, and proposals for more minor and major projects have been sent to the UGC recently. The UGC has already granted 6 teacher fellowships (3 for completing Ph.D. and 3 for doing M.Phil.) in the current 12th plan of UGC, and waiting for 2 more teacher fellowships to be granted. The college library is rich in terms of collection and is innovative in its services. It caters very well to the students and teachers in academic activities. In addition to the book circulation, reference services to the library have very good IT based services providing to the users. It also has disabled students friendly facilities.

In addition to the college library, department libraries are also being maintained.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

A well-developed human resource management system is practiced in the institution by the college management, and proper training is provided time to time. Our institution introduced and implemented an online portal (cms.unitywomenscollege.in) for college management especially for teaching and learning management. Many other measuring parameters for teaching and learning evaluation were introduced like Tutorial Scheme &

Performance Evaluation Sheets, TSPEs book, Teachers Work Diary, Mark List Templates, etc.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

As per UGC norms and University Act and Statute, faculties are selected and recruited as and when needed by the college management. Casual, contract and ad-hoc laborers are recruited time to time by the management.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The Computer Science Department has been maintaining collaboration with IT firms at Malappuram, Calicut and Trissur Districts for conducting seminars and workshops. Also the Department has been conducting Industrial visits. The Department of Commerce has been sending their 6th semester B.Com. Computer Applications students for On the Job Training (OJT) to the various banks every year.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The institution follows the policy of Government of Kerala and regulations of University of Calicut in the admission of students to various programmes. The affiliating university invites applications for admission to the various programmes offered by the colleges through newspaper calls and University website. The institution ensures wide publicity to its programmes through the College Prospectus and institutional Website. A single window system is in operation for admission to both of the undergraduate and postgraduate programmes offered by the institutions under the affiliating University where the applicants make a single application specifying the choice of preference of colleges and allotments are made accordingly.

6.4 Welfare schemes for Teaching Staff, non-teaching Staff and Students

A number of welfare measures have been taken to improve the wellbeing, satisfaction of the students, faculty and administrative staff.

Teaching staff

The management provides salary advance to the staff whenever there is delay in getting approval and salary. In many cases salary to the temporary and guest faculty has also been provided by the management. The management has also played its role as a financial supporter in case of life threatening situations of its staff and their family. To meet the financial demands and crisis of the staff, a credit society also provides financial assistance in the form of interest free loan to the extent of Rs. 60,000/-. Almost 90 % of the staff has availed this facility.

Non-Teaching staff

The welfare schemes provided by the management for the benefits of teaching staff are also extended and available to non-teaching staff. On many occasions the management as well as staff club comes forward to financially support the ad-hoc staff such as Bus and Co-operative store staff.

Students

The management, Staff Club, and PTA provide financial support in the form of Free Transportation, Scholarships, Books, Dress, and Accommodation in the hostel for economically backward students of the college. As a part of Silver Jubilee Celebration of the institution a home (**Snehabhavanam**) is constructed for a needy and poor student in our college.

6.5 Total corpus fund generated

Manjeri Unity Women's College Co-operative Society Limited No. M539, a society formed for the benefit of staff and students of the college, has secured a profit of Rs. 84700 (Rupees Eighty Four Thousand and Seven Hundred) for the year 2016-17 as per the audit conducted by the department of Co-operation, Government of Kerala during 2017-18. A part of the profit – Common Good Fund- was utilized to install water purifiers with RO, UV, UF facilities in the campus.

6.9 What efforts are made by the University/ Autonomous College for Examination Reforms?

Since our college is neither a University nor an Autonomous institution we have little control and role in the conduct of the exams. However many members of the management council, teaching and non-teaching staff etc. are members in various administrative and academic bodies like Syndicate, Senate, Academic Council, Board of Faculties and Board Of Studies. These members play an important role in the reformation process of examination system of the University.

6.10 What efforts are made by the University to promote autonomy in the affiliated/constituent colleges?

The college is affiliated to Calicut University. Five of the colleges which were previously affiliated to the University have already been granted autonomy. Some of the other outstanding colleges are under the process of getting autonomy. Our college is also making efforts in this direction.

6.11 Activities and support from the Alumni Association

- The college Alumni Association is very active and creative. The alumni of the college regularly meet during the second Saturday of every July. They sponsor merit-cum means scholarship for outstanding and needy students. They also provide monetary support for infrastructure development. For instance, they sponsored a two wheeler parking lot for students. The alumni of English Department donated a collar mike for teachers engaging combined classes.
- An annual alumni meet, entitled *Regalia 2017*, was organized in the campus on 11 March 2017, in which around 250 alumni participated. College management committee members, PTA representative, Principal and faculty members were also present in the occasion. Proficiency prizes were awarded to the toppers of all UG departments on the same day, to motivate the learning environment in the campus.
- Mrs. Shani Jesty, an alumna of the Home Science department who is currently working as the Supervisor of ICDS scheme of the government of Kerala is contributing Rs. 1500/- per year for the best outgoing student of the department. This endowment is named after her father.
- Mrs. Nadeera Kurikkal, another alumna of the department delivered a lecture on the career opportunities for FCS graduates. Another alumna Raseena conducted a workshop on handicrafts titled “Wealth out of waste” to the students of the college.
- The alumni are actively involved in the annual Home Science Fests by setting up of their stalls.
- The alumni of the department of Computer Science instituted yearly merit cum means scholarship entitled Royal Computer Science Alumni Association Scholarship (RCSA) for three best students of the department @ Rs. 1000/- each.
- Interactive Session on 29th June 2017 with Ms. Ramees Jebin, our B. Sc. Chemistry student during 2012-15. Now completed M. Sc. Chemistry from CUSAT.
- Text Books are given to Class Toppers by the Alumni of Chemistry Department every year.

- Incinerators: The Incinerators set up at the college and hostel is used to burn up sanitary napkins.
- Gardening in The Campus: Students and staff take effort to make the campus green by planting trees and shrubs.
- Installed high capacity waste bins at different parts of the campus.
- Celebrated/organized sapling plantation and cleaning programmes in connection with World Environment Day Celebration on June 5, 2017 under National Service Scheme (NSS). Environment Day oath was also undertaken.
- Environment Day was observed on 5th June 2017 in association with Department of Forest and Wildlife. The function was also arranged in the campus on the same day to present the Vanamithra Award of 2016-17 to the College.
