COLLEGE PROFILE


KAHM Unity Women's College was established in 1991 and is run by Muslim Educational and Cultural Association (MECA), a registered society. Started as a First Grade Aided College affiliated to the University of Calicut, it is the first multi-disciplinary (Arts, Science & Commerce) women's college in Malappuram District. It has also the unique distinction of being the first institution of this kind run by the Muslim Community in Kerala. The institution aims mainly at the upliftment of women in general and the educationally backward Muslim women in particular, through quality education.

Situated 1.6 km off Manjeri-Calicut Road, at 'Koodakkara', the college currently runs 10 undergraduate programmes, 7 postgraduate programmes and two research programmes in a panoramic setting with enchanting greenery. The college has creditable academic as well as co-curricular accomplishments till date. Transportation facilities, hostel, physical fitness centre, indoor stadium, library with internet facilities, incubation centre and full-fledged IT labs make the college one of the most sought after in the district. The college is included in UGC 2(f) and 12(B) during 1998. The college is received minority status from National Commission for Minority Education Institution (NCMEI) on 2010. FOUNDER PRESIDENT & MANAGER



Jb. Korambayil Ahamed Haji (1930–2003)

Korambayil Ahamed Haji, former Secretary of Kerala State Muslim League and the founder of Unity Women's College was known as a 'gentle man politician'. He was not only a politician, but also a lover of art, games, sports, football in particular, and literature, who represented Mankada and Kuttippuram constituencies in Kerala Assembly. A deputyspeaker once, he was later elected to Rajya Sabha. As a recognition of his services to the Mappila art & literature, he was awarded 'Kalaprathiba Rathnam'. It was during his tenure as chairman that the dream of Mahakavi Moyinkutty Vaidyar Smarakam materialized. Having a long association with Hidayathul Muslimeen Sabha, Manjeri, as general secretary, he was the president of Manjeri Central Mahallu. He was the secretary of Mampad College which was later handed over to MES. In 1991, his dream of founding an Arts & Science college for women in Manjeri was fulfilled when Unity Women's College was inaugurated by Syed Mohammed Ali Shihab Thangal at a function chaired by Dr. T. K. Raveendran, the then Vice-chancellor of Calicut University. He was the president of Muslim Educational and Cultural Association as well as the Manager of Unity Women's College. In recognition of his invaluable contributions to the college, the institution was later renamed in his honor. A memorial speech is held in each year on 18th December and celebrated as Foundation Day.

FOUNDER GENERAL SECRETARY



Jb. Hassan Mahmood Kurikkal (1950–2012)

Jb. Hassan Mahmood Kurikkal was the founder General Secretary of Unity Women's College, who was then the President of Malappuram District Council. Born in the Kurikkal family of Manjeri, he had his UG education at Farook College and LLB from Aligarh Muslim University.

Opting legal practice in Manjeri, he later became a full-time politician, and eventually became the Municipal Chairman and also the first and last president of Malappuram District Council. Falling sick during his presidency, bedridden for about 15 years, his strong will and compassion kept him strong enough to be significantly involved in solving people's problems. His was the last word in Manjeri politics, especially in the coalition politics. He served Unity College as its first General Secretary for about two decades.

He is renowned lawyer in Manjeri Bar current president and Malappuram District Cooperative Bank. An ardent orator, he had his education at NSS College, Manjeri, Farook College and Law College, Ernakulam. He was elected to the Assembly for Manjeri Kerala constituency in 2021. Despite his involvement and engagement in many other fields, he leads the developmental activities of the college.



Er. O. Abdul Ali

Born in Manjeri in 1948, Jb. O. Abdul Ali had his education at Farook College and Engineering College, Thrissur. After education he served the Indian Airlines, Bangalore; Kerala State Electricity Board, Manjeri; and the Engineering Department of Calicut University. He was one of the founding members of Unity Women's College and succeeded Jb. Korambayil Ahamed Haji as Manager of the college in 2003. A member of the Syndicate of Calicut University from 2013 to 2017, he is one of the Joint Secretaries of Kerala College Private Management Association and Federation of Muslim Colleges. He represented the college in MIELES Program in Barcelona, Stockholm, Nicosia and Berlin.

PROGRAMMES OF STUDY

(A) CHOICE BASED CREDIT SEMESTER SYSTEM (CBCSS)

The CBCSS system is a University Grants Commission initiative that enhances and promotes educational liberalization of traditional higher education models. As an internationally recognized system, CBCSS provides opportunities and avenues for learning core subjects while also exploring additional avenues of learning beyond core subjects for an individual's holistic development. It provides a learning platform in which the student or knowledge seeker can select a course from a list of elective, core and soft skill courses. CBCSS allows students to study at different times and at different institutions to complete a single course. Under this system, credits earned at one institution can be transferred. At University of Calicut, the system was first implemented in the 2009-10 academic year, and the Board of Studies revised the CBCSS UG Regulation in 2019 to make it applicable to all regular and SDE UG programmes. The system will be monitored in colleges affiliated with the University of Calicut by a College Level Monitoring Committee led by the Principal.

(B) FOUR YEAR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMME (FYUGP)

The Calicut University Four Year Undergraduate Programme (CU-FYUGP), starting in 2024-25, is a transformative initiative in Kerala's higher education. Supported by the Academic Council and the Kerala State Higher Education Council, the programme combines lectures, tutorials, lab work and project-based learning to offer a comprehensive education. The curriculum includes single major, major with multiple disciplines, major with minor, major with vocational minor and double major pathways, emphasizing outcome-based education aligned with industry needs. The CUFYUGP committee will ensure quality control for each programme.

The structured credit system of FYUGP requires 133 credits for a three-year UG Degree, 177 credits for a four-year UG Degree (Honours) and 177 credits for a four year UG Degree (Honours with Research), with a focus on core, elective and internship courses, and optional or mandatory research projects. The curriculum encompasses General Foundation Courses, Discipline Specific Pathway Courses and Capstone Components fostering critical thinking, communication and interdisciplinary knowledge. The programme's flexibility and focus on holistic development prepare students for professional success.

COLLEGE RULES

General Rules

- 1. Use of mobile phones is restricted in the college campus (other than monitored use).
- 2. Students shall behave with dignity and courtesy in the college.
- 3. Students shall always carry identity cards with them.
- 4. Political or such organizational activities of the students shall not be permitted in the campus.
- 5. Meeting of any kind shall not be organized or any sort of fund is to be be collected without the permission of the Principal.
- 6. Students shall not indulge in any kind of misdemeanour bringing disgrace to the institution.
- 7. Students shall not entertain visitors without prior permission.
- 8. Prescribed uniform is compulsory for the students on all days.
- 9. Government has made it clear that ragging in any form should be sternly and effectively prevented. Whenever a criminal offense is committed in the name of ragging whether within the campus of an educational institution or in a hostel or otherwise, the Principal or Warden will report at the nearest Police Station and not wait until a complaint in this regard is received from the person affected. Appropriate disciplinary action will also be taken against the accused.
- 10. The transportation facility offered by the Management Committee of the college is a facility which is not obligatory. Students using college bus facility shall strictly follow the rules of the Bus Committee.
- 11. Each student shall be a member of one of the clubs.

Fee and Attendance Regulations

1. Students who do not enjoy fee concession shall remit the fees, which will be collected in the office in 2 terms on the days noted in the calendar and also as notified from time to time.

- 2. Fee will be collected in the college office only on the specified collection days from 9.30 am to 3.00 pm.
- 3. No student shall be absent from the class without giving leave application.
- 4. Students absenting themselves without leave for ten consecutive working days will be struck off the rolls.
- 5. Application for leave in the specified format (available in the college cooperative store) shall be forwarded to the HoD through the class tutor.
- 6. The Attendance Progress Conduct certificate (APC) required for appearing in University examinations will not be granted unless the HoD is satisfied with the attendance, conduct and progress of the student.

Disciplinary Rules

- 1. Students are responsible for their conduct within the college premises and are prohibited from doing anything, either inside or outside the college, which will amount to a breach of discipline or interference in the smooth functioning of the college. A student shall be liable to disciplinary action for any act of indiscipline. Disciplinary action may involve a warning and/or suspension from classes, from the college library, or even from the college as decided by the College Discipline Committee.
- 2. Students shall behave themselves in a civil and dignified manner, and refrain from offensive behaviour towards any section of the college community. Uncivilized behaviour and/or language shall be sternly dealt with.
- 3. A student who faces any disciplinary action shall not be eligible for any special recognition from the college. This includes all kinds of participation in intra-college and inter-college activities, scholarships, financial assistance provided to students, and participation in the college festival and all other sports activities.
- 4. Students shall maintain silence and decorum in classrooms and desist from disorderly behaviour. They must not loiter in the corridors or in front of classrooms or office rooms and create noise. During their free periods, students are advised to work in the library or reading room, without causing any disturbance whatsoever. Verbal abuses will also be considered as violations of discipline.

- 5. Possession or the consumption of alcohol/ drug or any other addictive/illegal material is strictly prohibited in the college premises and will lead to termination of the student from the college.
- 6. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited and is a punishable offense. Anyone involved in such cases will be dealt with a very strict antiragging policy.
- 7. Students shall take proper care of the college furniture and fixtures. They must not cause any damage to the college property.
- 8. Students are notified to not litter, lay or throw any kind of garbage in and around the campus.
- 9. A designated parking space is provided for all students to park their vehicle. No vehicle is allowed to be parked in any other part of the college premises.
- 10. Students suffering from any contagious or infectious diseases are suggested to not attend college during the phase of illness
- 11. Students who are regularly absent from the college for no valid reasons will be removed from the college rolls.
- 12. All notices/circulars issued from time to time will be binding on all students without exception.
- 13. Joining hands with Sustainable Development Goals, our campus adheres to the principle of a Green Campus. All stake holders must be responsible for protecting and preserving its biodiversity, and conserving resources.

SHIHAB THANGAL LIBRARY & INFORMATION CENTRE

The College Library, Shihab Thangal Library and Information Centre, operates within a newly expanded and renovated, multifunctional, two-story building spanning 10,000 square feet. The library houses an extensive collection of over 25,000 books along with comprehensive range of reference materials and a textbook bank. The Library subscribes to a large collection of national-international journals, magazines, periodicals, newspapers, etc.

The library includes dedicated sections for undergraduate and postgraduate students, research scholars, and faculty members. It features a

well-organized book rack section, spacious reading area, digital resource centre, reference section, periodicals section, question paper corner, career corner, and a Xerox centre.

The library is fully automated using the 'Bookmagic' Integrated Library Management Software, which includes an Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC). It also provides remote access to a vast array of e-resources, including N-LIST, supporting academic research with ease. The library is well connected with Wi-Fi, and the entire facility is IT-enabled and equipped with CCTV surveillance to ensure enhanced security.

The college library also conducts various user awareness programs to familiarize users with its diverse resources and services. Additionally, it organizes seminars, workshops, and competitions to promote and develop reading habits among students.

Library Rules

Borrowing Rules

QUALITY ASSURANCE MECHANISMS

ALL INDIA SURVEY OF HIGHER EDUCATION (AISHE)

To portray the status of higher education in the country, Ministry of Education has endeavoured to conduct an annual web-based AISHE since 2010-11. The survey covers all the institutions in the country engaged in imparting of higher education. Data is being collected on several parameters such as teachers, student enrolment, programmes, examination results, education finance and infrastructure. Indicators of educational development such as Institution Density, Gross Enrolment Ratio, Student-teacher ratio, Gender Parity Index and Per Student Expenditure will also be calculated from the data collected through AISHE. These are useful in making informed policy decisions and research for development of education sector.

INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE CELL (IQAC)

CONVEYANCE FACILITY

A full-fledged transport department functions in the college with buses to provide transport facility to students and staff from various places with nominal charges. This service is offered ensuring a hassle- free and safe transportation. College buses also transport students and faculty to special events, such as field trips or industrial visits. Now eleven college buses operate starting from different points between 8.30 am and 5.00 pm. College buses operate to 7 destinations: Manjeri, Kondotty, Kizhisheri, Pandikkad, Areakode, Pookkottoor and Malappuram (via Valluvambrum and Manjeri).

COOPERATIVE STORE

Text books, stationary materials and some consumable items are sold through the college cooperative store. All the staff and students are members of the society. The profit is shared with the members and materials are sold at rates lower than the market rates. Printing and photocopy facility are also available in the store.

MIELES DIGITAL STUDIO

Modernizing and Enhancing Indian e-Learning Educational Strategies (MIELES) is a European Commission funded project which collaborates Indian institutions with European Institutions. Our college is the one and only Arts and Science College from Kerala with this collaboration. The college has established a Digital Studio in 2020 under MIELES project to promote virtual learning through content creation and live stream or record lectures/courses by the faculties.

NETWORK RESOURCE CENTRE (NRC)

To keep abreast with the changing scenario in higher education, employment and research a NRC is set up in the campus. The centre, functioning in the college library, has broad band internet facility accessible to all students and staff.

RESIDENTIAL FACILITY

The college hostel functions in a permanent building in the campus. Hostel accommodation is available for a limited number of students. Those who wish to join the hostel shall submit a separate application after obtaining admission in the college and shall pay the establishment charges and caution deposit at the time of admission. The mess dues (ondividing system basis) and rent are to be paid monthly. The Principal of the college is the chief warden. The Chief Warden's decision will be the final in the admission and removal of students from the hostel. A faculty member nominated by the Principal will be the Deputy Warden. The inmates shall strictly adhere the following hostel rules.

- 1. Students should maintain personal hygiene and also keep their rooms and surroundings clean.
- 2. The study time will be from 6.30 P.M. to 10.30 P.M. (excluding the dinner time and 15 minutes for recreation).
- 3. Students should strictly maintain silence and should not get involved in other entertaining activities during study hours.
- 4. Ragging and other offensive activities are strictly prohibited in the hostel. If found guilty, the concerned students will have to face disciplinary actions including legal formalities.

- 5. The penalty for the offences committed in the hostel shall warrant punishments from the college too, since the hostel is a part of the institution.
- 6. Inmates of the hostel should maintain table manners and keep discipline in the dining hall.
- 7. Hostel dues should be cleared each month. If not followed, the defaulter's names shall be removed from the roll.
- 8. No inmates shall leave the hostel without permission from the Deputy Warden (the request to be given in written format). The hostel gate shall remain closed after 06:00 P.M.
- 9. The behaviour of the students towards the hostel authorities, staff and caretakers should be amiable and polite.
- 10. Day scholars or outsiders are not permitted to visit the hostel with out the permission of the Deputy Warden.

STUDENTS' AID FUND

INTERNAL EXAMINATION CELL

Centralised Internal examinations are conducted in each semester by the Internal Examination Cell. Progress cards are issued to the parents in the class wise PTA meetings convened by the class tutor after the internal examinations. No student is permitted to abstain herself from these examinations. Students not having sufficient Attendance, Progress and Conduct (APC) are not eligible to appear for university examination as per University rules.

MEDIA RELATIONS CELL

The Media and Public Relations Cell in the college is responsible for press-coverage and all media related activities. The Media Relations Cell looks after all communication and publications - internal & external and also serves as the official spokes person of the institute. The role of this cell is to manage relations with external stakeholders through several media relation activities. The College Union election will be held every year in the Presidential mode according to the regulations of University of Calicut. Staff Advisor and other faculty members assist the students for conducting various programmes.

A unit of NCC has been functioning in this college since 2005. The unitis functioning under 9 Kerala Girls Battalion NCC Calicut. The strength of our unit is 106. Main objectives of NCC are to develop qualities of character, courage, comradeship, discipline, leadership, secular outlook, spirit of adventure and the ideals of selfless service among youth to make them useful citizen.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

The main objective of NSS is to create a spirit of service among students to the fellow being and to the society. It also aims at the personality development of students by interaction and participation in various social and cultural activities. Every student completing 240 hours of social work and attending one special camp will be eligible for a certificate issued by University, which fetches 5 marks weightage for higher study. There are two units of NSS (Unit No. 171 and Unit No. 008) in the college each having an enrolment strength of 100.

NEWSLETTER

The college newsletter, *UNIque*: The Monthly Communique, is initiated by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) with the aim of documenting the activities of the college for future accessibility and keeping the students, faculty and other stakeholders informed about events and news within the college community.

CLUBS AND FORUMS

Various Cells and Clubs provide a platform for each and every student to showcase their talent, organizational skills and work in a team in order to aid the college to reach a higher platform. The clubs include dance, music, photography and art. They are constantly working throughout the semester to come up with ways to showcase the passion of their members. The Community Outreach and Internship Cells aid students in their attempts to

UNITY IN DIVERSITY

BIRD WATCHING

Students of our college are interestingly organized Bird watching in the surroundings of our college and nearby forests. It is a peaceful way to connect the students with nature and observe the bird biodiversity around us. This activity encourages students to spend time outdoors, develop patience, and practice mindfulness as they learn to observe birds' unique behaviours, habitats and songs. Also, bird watching is a relaxing activity and a fantastic way to connect with nature, learn about local wildlife, and sharpen their observation skills.

ETHNOMEDICINAL GARDEN

The Ethnomedicinal Garden is dedicated to plant species that have been traditionally used by indigenous cultures and local communities for their medicinal properties. It plays a vital role in safeguarding and promoting the knowledge of medicinal plants with cultural, historical and therapeutic importance. The focused garden in our campus hosts approximately 50 plant species from various families, renowned for their medicinal benefits, such as Vitex nigundo, Ocimum sanctum, Rauwolfia serpentina, Andrographis paniculata, Tinospora crispa, Piper longum, Cissus quadrangularis, Asparagus racemosus, Aristolochia indica, Solanum anguivi and Alpinia calcarata. As a hands-on learning platform, it offers students in Botany, Pharmacology, and Ethnobotany and related fields the chance to observe, identify and study these plants, enhancing their understanding of plant characteristics, growth habits and traditional applications. In addition to supporting research in Botany Pharmacology, the garden promotes the sustainable use of medicinal plants, contributing to conservation efforts and the preservation of indigenous knowledge in the campus.

FERN HORTICULTURE

Fern Horticulture, managed by the Botany Department, focuses on the cultivation, study and conservation of various fern species. The garden features ferns (*Pteris, Asplenium, Nephrolepis, Adiantum, Dryopteris, Selaginella, Lygodium, Angiopteris, Blechnum, Equisetum, Azolla* etc.) from diverse habitats, including temperate, tropical and subtropical regions, showcasing their adaptability and ecological significance. The Department

incorporates fern horticulture as part of the curriculum, allowing students to gain hands-on experience in care, propagation and environmental requirements of ferns. This includes understanding the growing conditions of ferns as well as learning propagation techniques. In addition to being an educational resource, fern horticulture on campus also contributes to biodiversity conservation by preserving endangered fern species and enhancing the green cover of the campus. It provides students and visitors with the opportunity to appreciate the beauty and ecological role of ferns in ecosystems, supporting the broader goals of environmental awareness and sustainability.

HISTORY MUSEUM

The Ernad History Museum is a treasure trove of cultural and historical significance. Inaugurated in 2014, the museum aims to preserve and showcase the region's rich heritage, promoting unity and cultural understanding.

The objectives of museum are:

- To showcase traditional knowledge and skills.
- To exhibit students' handmade replicas of historical monuments and artifacts.
- To showcase old tools and equipment's.
- To provide an interactive platform for learning and research.

Since its inception, the museum has welcomed numerous school students, researchers, and history enthusiasts. The museum boasts rare collections, including ancient coins, manuscripts, and agricultural tools. The exhibits also feature traditional clothing, jewellery, and utensils, offering a glimpse into the daily lives of our ancestors. Students' handmade items, such as replicas of historical monuments and artifacts, demonstrate their creativity and understanding of historical events. By preserving and showcasing the past, the History Museum inspires future generations to appreciate their cultural heritage and promote unity.

PISCICULTURE FACILITY

This setup is introduced by the zoology club to practice fish farming and feeding, focusing on sustainable methods, environmental impacts and economic viability. This setup includes water quality assessment, disease control and encouraging business in the field of fish farming. Hands-on trainings in local aquaculture systems are integrated to provide practical experience in managing fish farms.

POLLINATOR GARDEN/ BUTTERFLY RESERVE

Pollinator Garden is a specially designed area in the campus that focuses on attracting and supporting pollinators, viz. butterflies, bees and other insects, by planting herbs, shrubs and trees with nectar-rich flowers. The major plants including *Zinnia peruviana*, *Tithonia diversifolia*, *Cosmos caudatus*, *Commelina bengalensis*, *Clerodendrum infortunatum* etc. flourish in the garden to attract the pollinators. The garden plays a crucial role in preserving biodiversity by providing a habitat and food source for pollinators, which are essential for the fertilization of many plants and the production of fruits and seeds. It raises awareness about the importance of pollinators in ecosystems and contribute to the conservation of declining species. Beyond, they serve as educational spaces for students and the community to learn about the vital role of pollinators in maintaining ecological balance and ensuring food security.

This initiative enhances biodiversity by promoting environmental education, and provide hands-on learning experiences to the students. The garden focuses on planting native nectar plants and host species that attract and boost local butterfly populations. Students can learn the life cycle of butterflies, their role in pollination, and the importance of conserving pollinator habitats.

RAIN WATER HARVESTING FACILITY

College has implemented advanced rainwater harvesting facilities to promote water conservation and sustainability. The college has three rainwater harvesting tanks, constructed in 2011, 2017, and 2024, with capacities of 8,16,000 litres, 1,15,000 litres and 10,000,00 litres, respectively. Rainwater collected from rooftops is directed into recharge systems to replenish the groundwater table ensuring a steady water supply throughout the year. These systems reduce dependence on external water sources and support campus landscaping and eco-friendly initiatives. The initiative reflects the college's commitment to environmental conservation and responsible water management, ensuring sustainability and resource efficiency for future generations.

SKY WATCH

Our college has a Sky Watch Facility located on the terrace of the library block, offering an elevated platform for stargazing and celestial observations. Equipped with a refracting telescope, the facility provides students and astronomy enthusiasts with an opportunity to explore the wonders of the night sky. This scientifically enriching space is ideal for observing planets, stars and other celestial phenomena. The platform is designed to provide a clear, unobstructed view of the sky, ensuring an immersive experience for users. Sky-watching sessions and workshops are also conducted to cultivate interest in astronomy among students and staff. The facility serves as a hub for scientific curiosity, making it a unique asset to our institution.

ZOOLOGY MUSEUM

The Rosellin Frankelin Zoology Museum is a specialized facility setup to the preservation and display of specimens from the animal kingdom, focusing on both Chordata and non-Chordata. The museum has an extensive collection of vertebrates like mammals and fish, and invertebrates such as arthropods, mollusks and cnidarians. The skeleton systems of some animals are also displayed to study the structure and function. Moreover, the museum inspires curiosity and education for students in terms of practical views. Also, the museum has a lot of specimens and their taxonomic descriptions to promote a deeper understanding of animal diversity, evolution and ecological roles, serving as an educational hub for students.
